In May, PHFC received word that the Presbyterian Endowment Trust had awarded \$10,000 for the Ray Campbell Independent Living Village. In June, we received another \$10,000 from the Carrie E. and Lena V. Glenn Foundation in addition to \$25,000 from the Perry N. Rudnick Fund of the Community Foundation of Henderson County.

Pending decisions include the Dickson Foundation, the Glass Foundation, the Grant Foundation, the Bank of Granite, Progress Energy, Van Every, Wachovia, Pepsi, Bank of America and Gannett.

We will also continue to submit grants to foundations including Staples Foundation for Learning, the Beaver Family Foundation and the Black Mountain Kiwanis.

Ray Campbell Independent Living Village Plans Unveiled

At their June 9 meeting, PHFC's board of directors broke ground on the Ray Campbell Independent Living Village. Architectural renderings of the facility were unveiled as well.

The village concept will include a lodge with staff quarters and a community area. In a semi-circle out from the lodge will be student and volunteer cottages. Initially, the village will feature three-four cottages-one for volunteers and two-three for youth. This plan will allow for the addition of future cottages.

Architect Scott Mitchell of Charlotte, NC, is designing the village at cost.
